WORLD HISTORY PIEMASTER PROJECT

Purpose: In World History we are driven by nine major themes. This project forces each student group to focus on these themes and how that particular theme they chose to research was comparable to other regions in the world how that theme changed over time.

Process: In each class students will be divided into 3-4 person teams and each team will be assigned a specific topic for the chosen theme. Students will have a period of time to research and create a group document that answers each of the following:

- 1. Events dealing with each theme (P.I.E.M.A.S.T.E.R) on each region of the world
- 2. Chronology from the beginning of the time period to the end (6-10 events per region)
- 3. Maps, charts, and images that visually help presentation of topic and help explain it (1 per region)
- 4. Identification of changes and continuities that exist in your region in regards to your theme
- 5. Analyses that explain the change, continuity, and comparative nature of each region to another in regards to your assigned theme or themes per region
- 6. Role that the topic plays in today's world (2014).

Evaluation: This is a MAJOR GRADE.

Rubric:

- 1. Organization, neatness, clarity 1 point
- 2. 6 pieces of evidence, described explicitly, on each theme. 9 points
- 3. Visual images and identification of theme 9 points
 - a. Artwork, architecture, map, or photograph-
- 4. Comparison and analysis or contrast and analysis for each theme WITH ANOTHER REGION 9 point
- 5. Change and analysis or continuity and analysis FOR YOUR REGION ONLY- 1 point
